## **Remembrance Day**

As a critical part of the cadet movement, cadets from 223 Red Lion Royal Canadian Air Cadets Vernon supported veterans and paid their respects on Remembrance Day. On the weekends approaching the 11th, 223 Red Lion Squadron had all cadets on deck poppy tagging, raising money towards the Vernon Legion Branch #25, the Armstrong Legion Branch #35, and the Oyama Legion Branch #189. As Remembrance Day came, the majority of 223 went to the Kal Tire Place Stadium



## **Air Cadet ranking & Mandatory Fitness Test**

Fitness test at Squadron 223 took place on Thursday, December 14. Fitness test successful completion is a requirement for most of the Cadets to be able to rank up. <u>Here</u> is a great outline what are the requirements for Air Cadet ranking. The Cadet Fitness Assessment is conducted at the beginning and end of the squadron training year to track personal fitness level.

The Cadet Fitness Assessment is designed to assess the following three areas of fitness: cardiovascular endurance; muscular strength; and. muscular flexibility.

Cardiovascular component to include the 20-m Shuttle Run Test, which is scored by the number of laps completed.

Muscular strength component, to include:

- curl-up, which is scored by counting the number of curl-ups completed
- push-up, which is scored by counting the number of push-ups completed
- muscular flexibility component, to include:
  - o shoulder stretch
  - back-saver sit and reach

## **Marksmanship Program**

The 223 Red Lion Air Cadets **Marksmanship program gives youth a chance to work with air rifles**. Cadets will learn about the safety precautions when handling a rifle as well as effective shooting techniques. They are given the opportunity to practice their shooting skills and compete against other squadrons. This marksmanship program teaches the cadets about patience and skill while shooting. I encourage all cadets and other youth to try the marksmanship program.

#### **Biathlon**



**Biathlon is a sport that involves cross country skiing and shooting**. There is a 1.5 loop that is skied and followed by a round of shooting of 5 targets. The type of races determines the loops

skied, rounds of shooting and how shooting misses are dealt with. If a shot is missed cadets will ski a penalty loop or receive a time penalty for each miss - depending on the type of race.

This is the squadron's third biathlon season. We are fortunate to have a world class facility to train at!

We had 12 cadets from 223 to come out and train. The next few weeks the cadets will be learning to ski and will be shooting at a world class range in the weeks to come.

What cadets are working towards:

The first competition is the Zone competition January 21 at Sovereign Lake. Cadets will be paired with a teammate for the competition and scored together. Successful pair will move on to Provincials that are being held in Mount Washington February 10th.

#### Ways to support your cadet in biathlon:

- Ensure they each a substantial breakfast before practice and that they have a good lunch, snacks and water for at the hill
- Get them to bring a change of clothes for lunch - it is easy to get chilled at break
- Get them to dress warm
